advocated against hate Journeys can be physical and intellectual they can crisscross leave traces and overlap This book takes the reader from two starting points a small Romanian town in the foothills of the Carpathians and a two storey house in an unusually tranquil street in S o Paulo Brazil to the heart of the twentieth century avant garde As it shows Tristan Tzara and M rio de Andrade traversed borders and geographical points and their poetics meet in Mozambique Parisian caf s and Bantu chants
