Reid, 2017-10-09 Including contributions from leading scholars in the field from both Australia and North America this collection explores diverse approaches to writing the lives of historians and ways of assessing the importance of doing so Beginning with the writing of autobiographies by historians the volume then turns to biographical studies both of historians whose writings were in some sense nation defining and those who may be regarded as having had a major influence on defining the discipline of history The final section explores elements of collective biography linking these to the formation of historical networks A concluding essay by Barbara Caine offers a critical appraisal of the study of historians biographies and autobiographies to date and maps out likely new directions for future work Clio's Lives is a very good scholarly collection that advances the study of autobiography and biography within the writing of history itself taking theoretical questions in significant new directions The contributors are well known and highly respected in the history profession and write with an insight and intellectual energy that will ensure the book has considerable impact They examine cutting edge issues about the writing of history at the personal level through autobiography and biography in diverse and innovative ways Together the writers have provided reflective chapters that will

be widely read for their impressive theoretical advances as well as being inspirational for new entrants to the disciplinary area Patricia Grimshaw University of Melbourne *Clio's Lives* brings together a most interesting and varied cast of contributors Its chapters contain sophisticated and well penned ruminations on the uses of biography and autobiography among historians These are clearly connected with the general themes of the volume This delightfully mixed bag makes very good reading and as well will serve as a substantial contribution to the study of the biography and autobiography Eric Richards Flinders University Locations of the Sacred William Closson James, 2006-01-01 Where do Canadians encounter religious meaning Not where they used to In ten lively and wide ranging essays William Closson James examines various derivations of the sacred in contemporary Canadian culture Most of the essays focus on the religious aspects of modern Canadian English fiction for example in essays on the fiction of Hugh MacLennan Morley Callaghan Margaret Atwood and Joy Kogawa But James also explores other non literary events and activities in which Canadians have found something transcendent or revelatory Each of the chapters in *Locations of the Sacred* can be read independently as a discrete analysis of its subject Taken as a whole the essays make up a powerful argument for a new way of looking at the religious in contemporary Canada not in the traditional ways of being religious but in activities and locations previously thought to be secular Thus the domains and modes of the religious are expanded not restricted **Unnamed Country** Dick Harrison, 1977 Americans have an idea of what the Great Plains did to the people who settled there but know little about the analogous process north of the 49th parallel or how it was reflected in fiction Dick Harrison's *Unnamed Country* fills this gap Harrison traces the varying literary responses to the Canadian prairies from the bewilderment of the first English speaking visitors who saw the country in essentially negative terms no wood no water down to the contemporary novelists who are employing sophisticated modern fictional techniques to reinterpret the whole experience from a new perspective Between these two ends of the literary continuum he finds the early writers of fiction too loaded down with what he calls excess cultural baggage brought from Britain or eastern Canada to see the country as it was the early twentieth century writers bemused by the myth of the garden who portrayed the prairies subdued and fruitful the prairie realists of the 1920s and 1930s akin to O E Rolvaag in their tragic view and their contemporaries the popular novelists who depicted the pioneering process in more affirmative tones **Christina Rossetti and Illustration** Lorraine Janzen Kooistra, 2002 Lorraine Janzen Kooistra's reading of Rossetti's illustrated works reveals for the first time the visual verbal aesthetic that was fundamental to Rossetti's poetics Her thorough archival research brings to light new information on how Rossetti's commitment to illustration and attitudes toward copyright and control influenced her transactions with publishers and the books they produced *Rewriting Apocalypse in Canadian Fiction* Marlene Goldman, 2005 This book traces the use of apocalyptic images in contemporary Canadian fiction The Literary History of Saskatchewan: Volume 1 David Carpenter, 2013-02-01 Saskatchewan's literary history is both colourful and complex It is also mature enough to deserve a critical investigation of its roots and origins its
