effectively halt the spread of infection For this 35th Anniversary Edition Brandt reflects on recent scholarship the persistence of sexually transmitted diseases and the trajectory of the HIV epidemic as they have informed contemporary conceptions of biomedicine and global health Canadian Books in Print ,1998 The Accommodated Animal Laurie Shannon, 2024-05-31 Shakespeare wrote of lions shrews horned toads curs mastiffs and hellhounds But the word animal itself only appears very rarely in his work which was in keeping with sixteenth century usage As Laurie Shannon reveals in The Accommodated Animal the modern human animal divide first came strongly into play in the seventeenth century with Descartes s famous formulation that reason sets humans above other species I think therefore I am Before that moment animals could claim a firmer place alongside humans in a larger vision of belonging or what she terms cosmopolity With Shakespeare as her touchstone Shannon explores the creaturely dispensation that existed until Descartes She finds that early modern writers used classical natural history and readings of Genesis to credit animals with various kinds of stakeholdership prerogative and entitlement employing the language of politics in a constitutional vision of cosmic membership Using this political idiom to frame cross species relations Shannon argues carried with it the notion that animals possess their own investments in the world a point distinct from the question of whether animals have reason It also enabled a sharp critique of the tyranny of humankind By answering the question of the animal historically The Accommodated Animal makes a brilliant contribution to cross disciplinary debates engaging animal studies political theory intellectual history and literary studies

<u>Tlacuilolli</u> Karl Anton Nowotny, 2005 Appearing for the first time in English Karl Anton Nowotny s Tlacuilolli is a classic work of Mesoamerican scholarship A concise analysis of the pre Columbian Borgia Group of manuscripts it is the only synthetic interpretation of divinatory and ritual codices from Mexico Originally published in German and unavailable to any but the most determined scholars Tlacuilolli has nevertheless formed the foundation for subsequent scholarly works on the codices Its importance extends beyond the study of Mexican codices Nowotny's sophisticated reading of these manuscripts informs our understanding of Mesoamerican culture Of particular importance are Nowotny's corrections of errors in fact and interpretation in the Spanish edition of Eduard Seler's commentary on the Borgia Group George A Everett and Edward B Sisson have translated Nowotny's masterwork into English while maintaining the flavor of the original German edition To the core text they have added an extensive bibliography and constructed a framework of annotation that relates the principles in Tlacuilolli to current research This edition includes a selection of eleven stunning full color images chosen from the original catalog Magika Hiera Christopher A.
