The Bishop of the Old South Glenn Robins, 2006 As the owner of more than 200 slaves and a profitable sugar plantation, Bishop Polk commanded a unique platform from which he articulated a vision of the Old South that merged Episcopalian values and traditions with the region's more dominant evangelical religious culture. Polk displayed virtually no interest in his denomination's theological squabbles. Instead, his genius rested in his attempts to cultivate a religious solidarity among white Southerners of all classes and to broaden the social and cultural appeal of Episcopalianism in the South. To Be a Soldier Julian M. Olejniczak, 2015-02-06 West Point is a geographical location that was of critical importance during the Revolutionary War, the site of our nation's first military academy and the commissioning source of thousands of Army, Air Corps, Air Force, and even some Navy and Marine Corps officers who have led our nation's young men and now women in battle since the Academy's founding on March 16, 1802, by President Thomas Jefferson. This volume contains a very selective military history of the United States that focuses on the Revolutionary War and the contributions of West Point graduates to subsequent wars, but with an emphasis on some of the lesser-known persons and events of the past 250 years or so. It also touches upon many of the customs and traditions of the West Point experience. Many chapters include the stories of unsung or forgotten heroes and heroines. Men like John Stark, Daniel Morgan, Eleazer Derby Wood, Benjamin L. E. Bonneville, Oliver Otis Howard, Henry Ossian Flipper, Calvin Pearl Titus, Charles Young, Norman D. Cota, and Donald W. Holleder, plus women like the Warner sisters, Laura Walker, and Emily Perez. One of the final chapters, however, deals within the kindest sense of the term with a few rogues of West Point like Edgar Allan Poe, James McNeil Whistler, Hugh S. Johnson, and The Mole.

William Harding Carter and the American Army Ronald Glenn Machoian, 2006 In this first full-length biography of William Harding Carter, Ronald G. Machoian explores Carter's pivotal role in bringing the American military into a new era and transforming a legion of citizen soldiers into the modern professional force we know today. Machoian follows Carter's career from his boyhood in Civil War Nashville, where he volunteered to carry Union dispatches through his involvement in bitter campaigns against Apaches in the Southwest, to his participation in the Indian Wars' tragic final chapter at Wounded Knee in 1890. Carter's life and work reflected his times: the Gilded Age and the Progressive era. Machoian shows Carter as an able intellectual attuned to contemporary cultural trends and tirelessly devoted to ensuring that the U.S. Army kept abreast of

them In collaboration with Secretary of War Elihu Root he created the U S Army War College and pushed through Congress the General Staff Act of 1903 which replaced the office of commanding general with a chief of staff and modernized the staff structure Later he championed the replacement of the state militia system with a more capable national reserve and advocated wartime conscription Since his death in 1925 Carter s important contributions toward modernizing the U S Army have been overlooked Machoian redresses this oversight by highlighting Carter s contributions to the U S military s growth as a professional institution and the nation s transition to the twentieth century *The Diaries of John Gregory Bourke Volume 3* John Gregory Bourke,2003 These volumes are a first person narrative of a soldier in the West during the Great Sioux War and the Cheyenne Outbreak as well as other important Indian battles Extensive information is also given about the Native Americans living during those times West Point Theodore J. Uncompromising Activist Katherine Reynolds Chaddock, 2017-09-27 Almost forgotten until his papers were discovered in a Chicago attic Richard Greener was a pioneer who broke educational and professional barriers for black citizens He was also a man caught between worlds Richard Theodore Greener 1844 1922 was a renowned black activist and scholar In 1870 he was the first black graduate of Harvard College During Reconstruction he was the first black faculty member at a southern white college the University of South Carolina He was even the first black US diplomat to a white country serving in Vladivostok Russia A notable speaker and writer for racial equality he also served as a dean of the Howard University School of Law and as the administrative head of the Ulysses S Grant Monument Association Yet he died in obscurity his name barely remembered His black friends and colleagues often looked askance at the light skinned Greener s ease among whites and sometimes wrongfully accused him of trying to pass While he was overseas on a diplomatic mission Greener s wife and five children stayed in New York City changed their names and vanished into white society Greener never saw them again At a time when Americans viewed themselves simply as either white or not Greener lost not only his family but also his sense of clarity about race Richard Greener s story demonstrates the human realities of racial politics throughout the fight for abolition the struggle for equal rights and the backslide into legal segregation Katherine Reynolds Chaddock has written a long overdue narrative biography about a man fascinating in his own right who also exemplified America s discomfiting perspectives on race and skin color *Uncompromising Activist* is a lively tale that will interest anyone curious about the human elements of the equal rights struggle
