

religion this book will make you think hard about your beliefs Or if you are uncertain this book will help you think clearly about science and religion This book thinks critically about materialism the theory that only matter exists and mind or spirit is a byproduct of matter It shows that what philosophers call dualism the idea that matter and spirit exist independently is more plausible than materialism It begins by reviewing the arguments that philosophers have used to show that computers cannot have consciousness.
