Develop paragraph ideas.

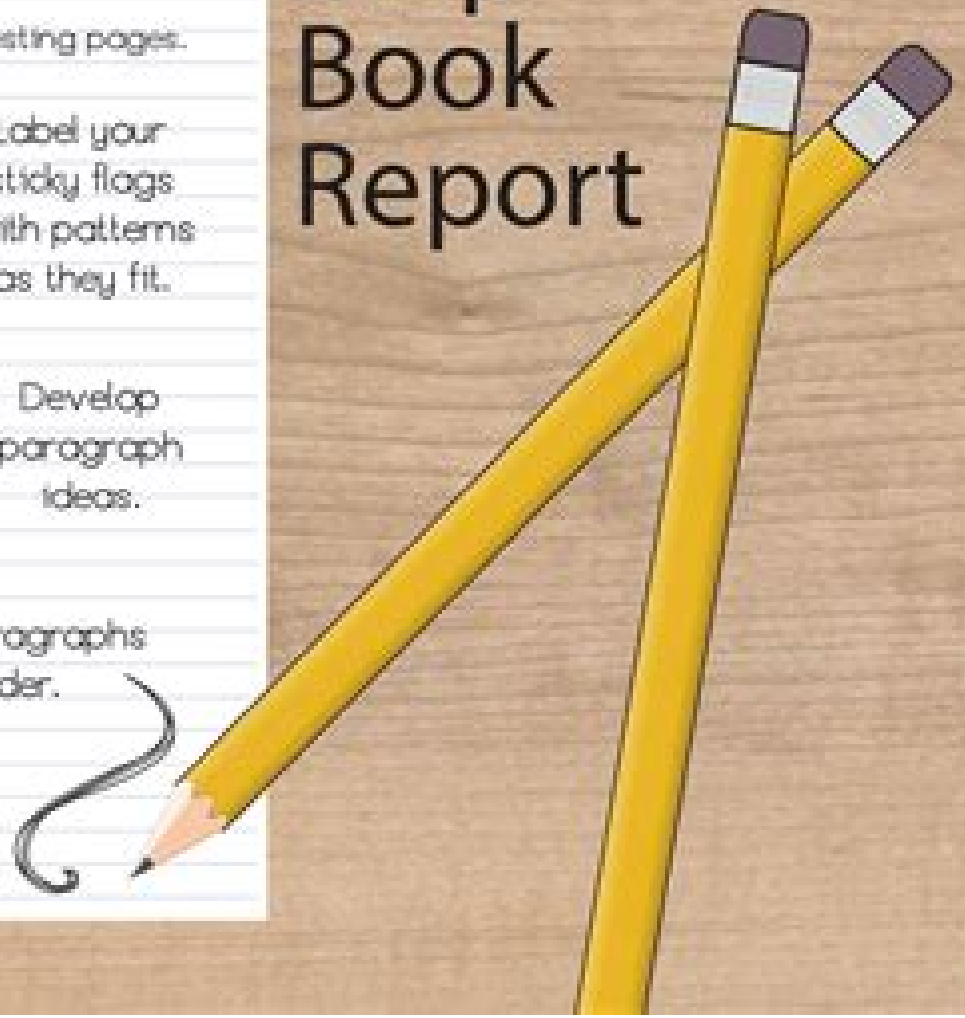
9.
