**The Marriage Plot** Jeffrey Eugenides, 2011-10-03 The new novel from the bestselling author of *Middlesex* and *The Virgin Suicides*

*Reading with a Difference* Arthur F. Marotti, 1993 *Reading with a Difference* is a collection of eighteen essays that examines how issues of gender race and cultural identity inform texts from the seventeenth century to the present Together the contributions document recent significant shifts occurring in the theoretical approach to the texts they study and illustrate how shifts in each of these categories affect how the others are viewed The first section of this anthology explores the notion that identity particularly gender identity is a cultural construct The essays in the second section consider ways in which race and gender intersect with cultural identity and how encounters between different cultures challenge any identity constructed in isolation First published in the journal *Criticism* these essays offer no blueprint for reading Instead they encourage a rereading of canonical texts and a questioning of how these texts face matters of gender race and cultural identity how they respond to the differences and the incongruities within the cultures from which they arise and to which they speak

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*The Marriage of Minds* Rachel Ablow, 2007 *The Marriage of Minds* examines the implications of the common Victorian claim that novel reading can achieve the psychic ethical and affective benefits also commonly associated with sympathy in married life Through close readings of canonical texts in relation to the histories of sympathy marriage and reading *The Marriage of Minds* begins to fill a long standing gap between eighteenth century philosophical notions of sympathy and twentieth century psychoanalytic concepts of identification It examines the wide variety of ways in which novels were understood to educate or reform readers in the mid nineteenth century Finally it demonstrates how both the form of the Victorian novel and the experience supposed to result from that form were implicated in ongoing debates about the nature purpose and law of marriage

**The Story of A** Patricia Crain, 2000 Richly illustrated with often antic images from alphabet books and primers *The Story of A* relates the history of the alphabet as a genre of text for children and of alphabetization as a social practice in America from early modern reading primers to the literature of the American Renaissance Offering a poetics of alphabetization and explicating the alphabet's tropes and rhetorical strategies the author demonstrates the far reaching cultural power of such apparently neutral statements as A is for apple The new market for children's books in the eighteenth century established for the republic of ABC a cultural potency equivalent to its high culture counterpart the republic of letters while shaping its child readers into consumers As a central rite of socialization alphabetization schooled children to conflicting expectations as well as to changing models of authority understandings of the world and uses of literature In the nineteenth century literacy became a crucial aspect of American middle class personality and subjectivity Furnishing the readers and writers needed for a national literature the alphabetization of America between 1800 and 1850 informed the sentimental reform novel as well as the self consciously aesthetic novel of the 1850s Through readings of conduct manuals

reading primers and a sentimental bestseller the author shows how the alphabet became embedded in a maternal narrative which organized the world through domestic affections Nathaniel Hawthorne by contrast insisted on the artificiality of the alphabet and its practices in his antimimetic hermetic *The Scarlet Letter* with its insistent focus on the letter A By understanding this novel as part of the network of alphabetization *The Story of A* accounts for its uniquely persistent cultural role The author concludes in an epilogue with a reading of postmodern alphabets and their implications for the future of literacy

**The Coupling Convention : Sex, Text, and Tradition in Black Women's Fiction** Ann duCille Associate Professor of English and African American Studies Wesleyan University, 1993-10-19 What does the tradition of marriage mean for people who have historically been deprived of its legal status Generally thought of as a convention of the white middle class the marriage plot has received little attention from critics of African American literature In this study Ann duCille uses texts such as Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* 1928 and Zora Neale Hurston's *Their Eyes Were Watching God* 1937 to demonstrate that the African American novel like its European and Anglo American counterparts has developed around the marriage plot what she calls the coupling convention Exploring the relationship between racial ideology and literary and social conventions duCille uses the coupling convention to trace the historical development of the African American women's novel She demonstrates the ways in which black women appropriated this novelistic device as a means of expressing and reclaiming their own identity More than just a study of the marriage tradition in black women's fiction however *The Coupling Convention* takes up and takes on many different meanings of tradition It challenges the notion of a single black literary tradition or of a single black feminist literary canon grounded in specifically black female language and experience as it explores the ways in which white and black male and female mainstream and marginalized traditions and canons have influenced and cross fertilized each other Much more than a period study *The Coupling Convention* spans the period from 1853 to 1948 addressing the vital questions of gender subjectivity race and the canon that inform literary study today In this original work duCille offers a new paradigm for reading black women's fiction

*The Family Novel in Russia and England, 1800-1880* Anna A. Berman, 2022 An in depth comparative analysis of the family novel as it developed as a genre in Russia and England during the course of the nineteenth century

**The Doctor in the Victorian Novel** Tabitha Sparks, 2016-03-23 With the character of the doctor as her subject Tabitha Sparks follows the decline of the marriage plot in the Victorian novel As Victorians came to terms with the scientific revolution in medicine of the mid to late nineteenth century the novel's progressive distance from the conventions of the marriage plot can be indexed through a rising identification of the doctor with scientific empiricism A narrative's stance towards scientific reason Sparks argues is revealed by the fictional doctor's relationship to the marriage plot Thus novels that feature romantic doctors almost invariably deny the authority of empiricism as is the case in George MacDonald's *Adela Cathcart* In contrast works such as Wilkie Collins's *Heart and Science* which highlight clinically minded or even sinister doctors uphold the determining logic of science and in

turn threaten the novel's romantic plot. By focusing on the figure of the doctor rather than on a scientific theme or medical field, Sparks emulates the Victorian novel's personalization of tropes and belief systems using the realism associated with the doctor to chart the sustainability of the Victorian novel's central imaginative structure: the marriage plot. As the doctors' Sparks examines increasingly stand in for the encroachment of empirical knowledge on a morally formulated artistic genre, their alienation from the marriage plot and its interrelated decline succinctly herald the end of the Victorian era and the beginning of Modernism.

*Novels, Needleworks, and Empire* Chloe Wigston Smith, 2024-03-12. The first sustained study of the vibrant links between domestic craft and British colonialism. In the eighteenth century, women's contributions to empire took fewer official forms than those collected in state archives. Their traces were recorded in material ways through the ink they applied to paper or the artifacts they created with muslin, silk threads, feathers, and shells. Handiwork such as sewing, knitting, embroidery, and other crafts formed a familiar presence in the lives and learning of girls and women across social classes, and it was deeply connected to colonialism. Chloe Wigston Smith follows the material and visual images of the Atlantic world that found their way into the hands of women and girls in Britain and early America in the objects they made, the books they held, the stories they read, and in doing so, adjusted and altered the form and content of print and material culture. A range of artifacts made by women, including makers of color, brought the global into conversation with domestic crafts and consequently placed images of empire and colonialism within arm's reach. Together, fiction and handicrafts offer new evidence of women's material contributions to the home's place within the global eighteenth century, revealing the rich and complex connections between the global and the domestic.

**Ageing, Duration, and the English Novel** Jacob Jewusiak, 2020. Argues that novelists graft ageing onto narrative duration and reveals the politics of senescence in nineteenth and early twentieth-century plots.

*Interwar Women's Comic Fiction* Nicola Darwood, Nick Turner, 2020-01-10. This collection of essays examines the work of five intermodernist writers. Some were established authors before the First World War, and others continued to write after the Second World War, but this book focuses particularly on their writing between 1918 and 1939. Elizabeth von Arnim, Stella Benson, Bradda Field Ivy, Compton Burnett, Stella Gibbons, and Winifred Watson had much in common: they all wrote novels full of comic moments which often challenged the cultural politics of the interwar period. Drawing on the literary and critical contexts of each novel, the essays here discuss the use of comic structures that enabled the authors to critique the dominant patriarchal structures of their time and offer an alternative, sometimes subversive, view of the world in which their characters reside. This book contributes to the growing scholarly interest in interwar fiction, focusing principally on novelists who have fallen out of public view. It widens our understanding both of the authors and of the continuing, highly topical, debate about interwar women novelists.

**Plots and Proposals** Karen Tracey, 2000. Boy meets girl. Boy proposes to girl. Girl refuses proposal. Then what? This provocative scenario provides the frame for a significant countertradition in popular nineteenth-century women's novels: the double proposal plot in which the heroine rejects and later accepts proposals from the same suitor. Exploring the American wing of this movement through the novels of Carolyn Hentz, Augusta Evans, Laura J. Curtis Bullard, E. D. E. N. Southworth, and Elizabeth Stuart Phelps, Karen Tracey investigates how each of these writers is constrained by her historical circumstances and how she uses her fiction to critique those circumstances. By considering two possible marriages between the same set of partners, the double proposal plot interrogates the role of middle-class women in courtship and in public life, as well as the quality of married life and the influence a woman potentially brings to it. Tracey charts the genre's evolution from novels that seek answers within renegotiated marriages to those that challenge the efficacy of marriage itself. Reconstructing some of the cultural circumstances that would have influenced the writing, publishing, and reading of the novels, *Plots and Proposals* examines how changing notions of love and romance both inform and are critiqued by this renegade fiction.

By the end of this period women who had once lost their common law property rights to their husbands reclaimed their own assets, regained economic agency and forever altered the legal and theoretical nature of wedlock by doing so. Yet in literary accounts reforms were neither as decisive as the law implied nor limited to marriage. Understanding the reform of married women's property as both an ideologically and materially substantial redistribution of the nation's wealth as well as one complicated by competing cultural traditions, this book explores the widespread ways in which women's financial agency was imagined by fiction that engages with but also diverges from the law in accounts of economic choices and transactions. Repeatedly, narratives by Austen, Dickens, Gaskell, Trollope, Eliot and Oliphant suggest both that the law is inadequate to account for the way that property enables and disrupts relationships and that the form of the Victorian novel in its ability to track intimate and intricate exchanges across generations is better suited to such tasks.
