Question	Answer
How can someone's family and household change over the course of life?	Can be born in to a nuclear family. Her parents may later separate, which means she may live in a lone parent family. Her mother may remarry which means she is now part of a reconstituted family.
What is a criticism of Parson's view of the family?	 Idealised version of the family and ignores dysfunctional families where child abuse and domestic violence occur. Feminists- family is a major source of female oppression. Marxists- families socialise children in to accepting the values of capitalism.
What is the Marxist view of the family?	Family serves the interests of capitalism. Key institution through which social inequalities continue from one generation to the next. E.g. through inherited wealth
What do Delphy and Leonard believe?	Focus on unpaid aspect of housework. Women are exploited by their husbands through work not being valued, financial dependence on husband. Putriorchal families maintain the patriorchal nature of society.
What is the difference between joint and segregated conjugal roles?	Asint- do not have a rigid division of household tasks and share many tasks. Spend much of their leisure time together. Segregated-clear division of labour in the home with tasks divided in to male and female tasks. Spend little leisure time together.
What is the 'new man'?	Helps out with household chores and child care
What are instrumental and expressive roles?	Instrumental role taken by the man as the breadwinner Expressive role taken by the woman as housewife/mother and provides emotional support.
What do Young and Wilmott talk about?	Symmetrical family due to rise in feminism.
How have parent-child relationships changed?	Children used to work, and were not seen as separate to adults- Education Act 1918 changed this. Today, relationships between parents and children are less authoritarian, children's views are taken seriously and listened to. Smaller family sizes mean that relationships are closer.
3 reasons for an increase in lone parent families:	Increase in divorce Changing attitudes- decline in stigma around single parents Feminism- women are able to leave unhappy marriages and support themselves.
3 reasons for changing patterns in fertility (number of children):	Birth control- introduction of the pill in 1960's and legalisation of abortion Feminism- women enter higher education and the workplace, not defined by motherhood Economic factors- today children are an economic burden, rather than providing a source of income.
What is serial monogamy?	When a divorced person enters in to a second marriage, then divorces, remarries and so on
