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The Public Burning Robert Coover, 1997 Vice President Richard Nixon the voraciously ambitious bad boy of the Eisenhower regime is the dominant narrator in an enormous cast that includes Betty Crocker Joe McCarthy the Marx Brothers Walter Winchell Uncle Sam his adversary The Phantom and Time magazine incarnated as the National Poet Laureate All of these and thousands more converge in Times Square for the carnivalesque auto da fe at which the Understanding Robert Coover Brian Evenson, 2003 This text takes on the work of Robert Rosenbergs are put to death Coover a major figure of postmodern metafiction In an analysis of Coover's short stories and novels it demonstrates how Coover writes in several different modes that cross over into one another The Art of Excess Tom LeClair, 1989 The **Cruft of Fiction** David Letzler, 2017-06 A 2017 Choice Outstanding Academic Title What is the strange appeal of big books The mega novel a genre of erudite tomes with encyclopedic scope has attracted wildly varied responses from fanatical devotion to trenchant criticism Looking at intimidating mega novel masterpieces from The Making of Americans to 2666 David Letzler explores reader responses to all the seemingly random irrelevant pointless and derailing elements that comprise these mega novels elements that he labels cruft after the computer science term for junk code In The Cruft of Fiction Letzler suggests that these books are useful tools to help us understand the relationship between reading and attention While mega novel text is often intricately meaningful or experimental sometimes it is just excessive and pointless On the other hand mega novels also contain text that though appearing to be cruft turns out to be guite important Letzler posits that this cruft requires readers to develop a sophisticated method of attentional modulation allowing one to subtly distinguish between text requiring focused attention and text that must be skimmed or even skipped to avoid processing failures The Cruft of Fiction shows how the attentional maturation prompted by reading mega novels can help manage the information overload that increasingly characterizes contemporary life The Underside of Politics Sorin Radu Cucu, 2013-11 This book explores the relation between nationhood literary culture and globalism in the context of the Cold War struggle over the legacy of European modernity a struggle to represent diverse experiences of the political after World War II and colonialism This book argues that during the Cold War modern political imagination is held captive by the split between two visions of universality freedom in the West vs social justice in the East and by a culture of secrecy that ties national identity to national security The significance of Cold War political modernity is made evident in the staging of dialogues between post 1945 American and Eastern European novelists Kundera with Roth Coover with Popescu and Kis and **Fiction in the Quantum Universe** Susan Strehle,2000-11-09 In this outstanding book Susan Strehle argues that DeLillo a new fiction has developed from the influence of modern physics She calls this new fiction actualism and within that framework she offers a critical analysis of major novels by Thomas Pynchon Robert Coover William Gaddis John Barth Margaret Atwood and Donald Barthelme According to Strehle the actualists balance attention to guestions of art with an

engaged meditation on the external actual world While these actualist novels diverge markedly from realistic practice Strehle claims that they do so in order to reflect more acutely what we now understand as real Reality is no longer realistic in the new physical or quantum universe reality is discontinuous energetic relative statistical subjectively seen and uncertainly known all terms taken from new physics Actualist fiction is characterized by incompletions indeterminacy and open endings unsatisfying to the readerly wish for fulfilled promises and completed patterns Gravity's Rainbow for example ends not with a period but with a dash Strehle argues that such innovations in narrative reflect on twentieth century history politics science and discourse Robert Coover .1989 The Covert Sphere Timothy Melley, 2012-10-23 In December 2010 the U S Embassy in Kabul acknowledged that it was providing major funding for thirteen episodes of Eagle Four a new Afghani television melodrama based loosely on the blockbuster U S series 24 According to an embassy spokesperson Eagle Four was part of a strategy aimed at transforming public suspicion of security forces into something like awed respect Why would a wartime government spend valuable resources on a melodrama of covert operations. Wilson, 2011-10-27 In works of literary fiction it is a part of the fiction that the words of the text are being recounted by some work internal voice the literary narrator One can ask similarly whether the story in movies is told in sights and sounds by a work internal subjectivity that orchestrates them a cinematic narrator George M Wilson argues that movies do involve a fictional recounting an audio visual narration in terms of the movie's sound and image track Viewers are usually prompted to imagine seeing the items and events in the movie's fictional world and to imagine hearing the associated fictional sounds However it is much less clear that the cinematic narration must be imagined as the product of some kind of narrator of a work internal agent of the narration Wilson goes on to examine the further question whether viewers imagine seeing the fictional world face to face or whether they imagine seeing it through some kind of work internal mediation It is a key contention of this book that only the second of these alternatives allows one to give a coherent account of what we do and do not imagine about what we are seeing on the screen Having provided a partial account of the foundations of film narration the final chapters explore the ways in which certain complex strategies of cinematic narration are executed in three exemplary films David Fincher's Fight Club von Sternberg's The Scarlet Empress and the Coen brothers The Man Who Wasn Politics and the Muse Adam J. Sorkin, 1989 These fourteen original essays on the politics of literature investigate t There aspects of our understanding of the political muse with a focus on American writing since World War II Essays include American Literature Politics and the Last Good War The Literary Art of the Hollywood Ten The Plight of the Left Wing Screenwriter and Amiri Baraka and the Politics of Popular Culture The Trash Phenomenon Stacey Michele Olster, 2003 The Trash Phenomenon looks at how writers of the late twentieth century not only have integrated the events artifacts and theories of popular culture into their works but also have used those works as windows into popular culture s role in the

process of nation building Taking her cue from Donald Barthelme's 1967 portrayal of popular culture as trash and Don DeLillo s 1997 description of it as a subversive people s history Stacey Olster explores how literature recycles American popular culture so as to change the nationalistic imperative behind its inception The Trash Phenomenon begins with a look at the mass media s role in the United States emergence as the twentieth century s dominant power Olster discusses the works of three authors who collectively span the century bounded by the Spanish American War 1898 and the Persian Gulf War 1991 Gore Vidal s American Chronicle series John Updike s Rabbit tetralogy and Larry Beinhart s American Hero Olster then turns her attention to three non American writers whose works explore the imperial sway of American popular culture on their nation's value systems hierarchical class structure in Dennis Potter's England Peronism in Manuel Puig's Argentina and Nihonjinron consensus in Haruki Murakami s Japan Finally Olster returns to American literature to look at the contemporary media spectacle and the representative figure as potential sources of national consolidation after November 1963 Olster first focuses on autobiographical historical and fictional accounts of three spectacles in which the formulae of popular culture are shown to bypass differences of class gender and race the John F Kennedy assassination the Scarsdale Diet Doctor murder and the O J Simpson trial She concludes with some thoughts about the nature of American consolidation after 9 11 Cruel and Unusual Brian Jarvis, 2004-01-20 From the excesses of Puritan patriarchs to the barbarism of slavery and on into the prison industrial complex punishment in the US has a long and gruesome history.
