Raise the Red Lantern Tong Su, 1993 This collection of three novellas includes *Nineteen Thirty Four Escapes* *Opium Family* and *Raise the Red Lantern* upon which the Academy Award nominated film was based *Raise the Red Lantern* Su Tong, 2004-07-06 The brutal realities of the dark places Su Tong depicts in this collection of novellas set in 1930s provincial China worlds of prostitution poverty and drug addiction belie his prose of stunning and simple beauty The title novella *Raise the Red Lantern* which became a critically acclaimed film tells the story of Lotus a young woman whose father's suicide forces her to become the concubine of a wealthy merchant Crushed by loneliness despair and cruel treatment Lotus finds her descent into insanity both a weapon and a refuge *Nineteen Thirty Four Escapes* is an account of a family's struggles during one momentous year plagued by disease death and the shady promise of life in a larger town the family slowly disintegrates Finally *Opium Family* details the last years of a landowning clan whose demise is brought about by corruption lust and treachery fruits of the insidious crop they harvest *Bluebeard* Casie Hermansson, 2009 *Bluebeard* is the main character in one of the grisliest and most enduring fairy tales A serial wife murderer he keeps a horror chamber in which remains of all his previous matrimonial victims are secreted from his latest bride She is given all the keys but forbidden to open one door of the castle This is a major study of the tale and its many variants in English from the 18th and 19th century chapbooks children's toybooks pantomimes melodramas and circus spectacles to the 20th century in music literature art film and theatre Adapted for the Screen Hsiu-Chuang Deppman, 2010-04-30 Contemporary Chinese films are popular with audiences worldwide but a key reason for their success has gone unnoticed many of the films are adapted from brilliant literary works This book is the first to put these landmark films in the context of their literary origins and explore how the best Chinese directors adapt fictional narratives and styles for film Hsiu Chuang Deppman unites aesthetics with history in her argument that the rise of cinema in China Hong Kong and Taiwan in the late 1980s was partly fueled by burgeoning literary movements Fifth Generation director Zhang Yimou's highly acclaimed films *Red Sorghum* *Raise the Red Lantern* and *To Live* are built on the experimental works of Mo Yan Su Tong and Yu Hua respectively Hong Kong new wave's Ann Hui and Stanley Kwan capitalized on the irresistible visual metaphors of Eileen Chang's postrealism Hou Xiaoxian's new Taiwan cinema turned to fiction by Huang Chunming and Zhu Tianwen for fine grained perspectives on class and gender relations Delving equally into the individual approaches of directors and writers Deppman initiates readers into the exciting possibilities emanating from the world of Chinese cinema The seven in depth studies include a diverse array of forms cinematic adaptation of literature literary adaptation of film auto adaptation and non narrative adaptation and a variety of genres martial arts melodrama romance autobiography documentary drama Complementing this formal diversity is a geographical range that far exceeds the cultural linguistic and physical boundaries of China The directors represented here also work in the U S and Europe and reflect the growing international resources of Chinese language cinema With her
