By defining the region through its external relationships and its entanglements with regions across Asia, rather than as a self-contained unit, the contributions in this volume outline how these transregional connections and networks evolved and changed over time, thus highlighting their singularity in comparison to developments in Western Europe. Based on recent research, *Collecting Asian Art* reveals neglected sources while reinterpreting well-known ones.
